TWO UPCOMING BOND VOTES-YOUR VOTES ARE IMPORTANT

July 31, 2012 7:00 a.m.-7:00 p.m. Pittsford Town Offices

At its meeting of June 20, Pittsford’s Select Board authorized two water-related bond votes for Tuesday, July 31, 2012 to be held at the Town Offices between 7:00 am and 7:00 pm.

A. INCORPORATION OF PITTSFORD FIRE DISTRICT #1, PROCTOR-PITTSFORD COUNTRY CLUB AND ASSOICIATED NEIGHBORS

DESCRIPTION: Town voters (all registered Town voters are eligible to vote) will be asked to authorize the borrowing necessary to construct a pipeline connection and booster pump station between the Town’s new water main along Route 7 and the water distribution system of the Pittsford Fire District # 1, which now supplies 24 customers on Orchard Hill with water, and a pipeline between the Fire District’s water distribution system and an existing water main currently serving Proctor-Pittsford Country Club and eight (8) residences tied into the Country Club’s service line from the Proctor water system. The total cost for this construction project is estimated to be \$260,000.00.

PURPOSE: (a) Fire District Number 1 wishes to dissolve and have the Town take over its water system; (b) The Country Club and the eight (8) residences on its service line face the loss of potable water when the Town of Proctor makes good on its plan to abandon all of its out-of-town customers; (c) The Town has an ample supply of water and welcomes new customers to share the cost of its system; and (d) The Town’s Water Fund stands to improve its financial condition through the proposed project, with new customer revenues estimated to exceed the costs of construction and maintenance of this additional infrastructure. It is the classic “win-win” proposition and the Town’s officials hope that you will take a moment on July 31 to vote in favor of this project.

B. LOAN FUND FOR INDIVIDUAL WELLS FOR PITTSFORD CUSTOMERS OF PROCTOR WATER

DESCRIPTION: As we all know, Proctor plans to abandon water service to its customers in Chittenden and Pittsford. For most folks, a bedrock well is the most logical choice for securing a new water source. However, some Proctor water customers in Pittsford would need financial assistance to afford to have a well drilled. In response to this need, the State has established a \$200,000.00 loan fund, through which towns may borrow necessary funds and subsequently loan the funds out to landowners in need of constructing a replacement water source. This bond vote will ask Town voters whether to authorize the Town to borrow these State funds and provide loans to Pittsford landowners facing an imminent loss of water by Proctor’s pending abandonment. Any funds loaned by the Town would, of course, have to be repaid by the individuals borrowing them. The Town’s officials have worked hard to make this assistance available to our neighbors in need and hope that you will vote in favor of this proposal.

SEWER RATES & SUMP PUMPS

Sewer Rates

The recent utility bill, covering usage for the first half of 2012, represents the final time sewer users will pay these rates. In the next bill, to be issued in six months, bills will for the first time reflect the cost of financing the recently completed (except for paving on Arch and Pleasant Streets) sewer system upgrade project.

The Water & Sewer Commission will, when setting the new sewer rates, try to strike a balance between the need to pay the costs of financing this project and saving for future needs on the one hand, with the need to keep rates affordable for users on the other hand. Under consideration in the next few months will be (a) the amount of user revenue needed and (b) the manner in which such revenue is to be collected. For example, some advocate discarding the current flat-rate structure in favor of a flow-based model based upon a user’s metered water usage (after all, only 13 sewer users do not also receive metered water from the Town).

If you have suggestions for the Water & Sewer Commission to consider in this regard, please contact the Town Manager or any member of the Commission, either one-on-one or at the Commission’s monthly meetings (typically on the evening of the third Tuesday of the month).

Sump Pumps

One of the reasons for the recent sewer system upgrade was to reduce the large amount of groundwater/stormwater flowing into the wastewater treatment plant. After all, it is inefficient and expensive to treat water when the plant is designed to treat sewage. It is hoped that the recent upgrade will substantially reduce the amount of water infiltration into the system.

It is believed that some basement sump pumps may be connected to the sewer system. If you think that you may have a sump pump connected to the sewer system, please contact the Town Manager. As the Town wishes to work with property-owners to find responsible and economical ways to deal with sump pump discharges, the Town would be happy to help you find alternative outlets for such water.

NOTICE RE PROPERTY TAXES

7/1/2012 TO 6/30/2013

Summertime means baseball, hot dogs...and property tax bills. The Grand List has been lodged by the Listers and tax rates have been set by the Select Board, based on the FY2013 budgets approved at Town Meeting in March. Property tax bills were mailed out to Pittsford property owners on July 16, 2012.

For the past four years, in view of ongoing tough economic times, the Select Board and Town Manager have worked together to "level fund" its General Fund budget. The voters at Town Meeting, however, did approve an increase in spending by the Highway Fund, in order to tackle needed projects on Depot Hill Road and Kendall Hill Road (aka the "truck Route").

Real and personal property taxes are due in three equal installments, due on or before **August 10, September 10 and November 9, 2012**. Taxes unpaid after the November 9, 2012 due date are delinquent. Postmarks are not accepted as timely payments. Checks should be made payable to: Town of Pittsford, P O Box 10, Pittsford, VT 05763.
